Letter from the Head



Dear Parent and Carers,

I hope you are all well and safe.

This week, I thought I would share with you what our school priorities are. As you may know, last term we had an Ofsted visit and it was incredibly complimentary and positive. Since this visit, we have continued to work behind the scenes and will obviously always continue to do so, to make Lanner the best school possible. Despite our curriculum coming out as a real strength, we want to continue to further develop and refine it. Therefore, we have focused our priorities around this area. Our main priorities are as follows: Priority One: Further enhance and refine the curriculum to ensure consistency of expectations across all subjects. Priority Two: Develop the school's use of assessment to ensure accurate identification of gaps and next steps for all children and Priority Three: Further develop leaders and leadership across the school and ensure a sustainable approach to the school's continued growth. If ever you need any additional information regarding these issues or to find out what we are doing, please feel free to pop in and ask me.

Other News / Parent volunteers: We are so fortunate to have such amazing parent helpers here at Lanner, and since I have been headteacher here (now in my fifth year), I have seen thousands of pounds being raised. This money is incredibly useful for us and we always make sure the money has a positive impact on the children. We have had a FOLS (friends of Lanner School) team previously, but Covid seemed to put this on hold for obvious reasons. Since restrictions have been lifted, we were blown away by the parent help and support at the summer fayre and thought that maybe it was a good time to rethink FOLS / Parent support. As a staff we have discussed this, and I also discussed it with some of the other head teachers. We decided that rather than having a 'team' of key parents (FOLS) whom we rely on, we thought we would continue with the summer Fayre approach and try and spread the burden - asking parents as and when needed. eg if it were a Y2 trip - we would address the year 2 parents. If it is a whole school event, we could send out a note on the newsletter etc. There are several reasons for this, but mainly it is to share the workload. Also, some schools have reported that parent groups can inadvertently form a 'voice' or unofficial accreditation to the school i.e. a go between for parents and schools. In some cases, the parent groups have even put some potential volunteer parents off from helping and sharing experiences with their children. Thankfully, this has never been an issue for us, but probably something we'd all like to avoid, as key messages can sometimes get misinterpreted and misrepresented. I would like to say thank you so much for ALL of your help over the years... it is amazing, and we are all really humbled by your support. Rest assured we'll be reaching out to you all soon, to carry on the amazing family / school relationship.

And that's all from me this week. I am looking forward to seeing all the children dancing around the school hall next week as we have our Halloween disco. A big thank you to Miss Leah for organising this, and to all the staff and parent volunteers who are mucking in.

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Year 4 Carn Euny Trip

We went to Carn Euny to learn more about what it was like in Cornwall in the Iron Age. We wanted to visualise what it was like when it was a village thousands of years ago. It's near Penzance and it's what's left of an Iron Age settlement. Barnaby W

As we walked in, we saw an underground chamber. This is called a fogou, which means cave in Cornish. The village had a wall around it to keep safe from wild animals and other tribes. Today, you can still see some of the walls and the stones which show the shape of the houses. Barnaby W

Life in the Iron Age was very violent, even more when the Romans invaded! Before the Romans invaded, the houses were called roundhouses but when the Romans came to Britain, they learnt new skills and now the houses were called courtyard houses, which were more comfortable than a roundhouse and a lot bigger. We had some time to explore, I explored the fogou, the Cornish word for cave. It was very interesting, there were different passageways, low and narrow. I could still stand up but I had to bend down to enter it. Kaia J

The village had a lot of mounds and was in the middle of nowhere but in the Iron Age it was good to be away from other people! It was weird to think that we had just been in a place where people would have lived thousands of years ago! We had learnt lots about what it was like to live in Cornwall in the Iron Age. Barnaby W

It was a lovely day, the weather was great and the walk was worth it. Now I really know what life would be like for an Iron Age person. Kaia J






















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Caterpillars have 12 eyes
